GME: Top Ten Unfathomable Facts*

Graduate Medical Education costs government payers about \$15 billion per year.

None of the money comes from private insurance companies. All of the government funding comes from taxes.

GME tax dollars are not paid directly to the residencies that produce the physicians. The money is paid to hospitals, which can basically spend the money however they want.

Hospitals do not ever have to explain how they've spent GME money.

The government doesn't pay different hospitals the same amount to produce the same physicians.

Hospitals that receive GME money are not obligated to produce the physicians that the country needs most.

It is unclear whether the government knows how the money for physician training is being used, but it probably doesn't.

Despite all of the above, we keep doing the same thing year after year, and alternatives that work are not continued.

We know what workforce we need to get better results. But instead tax dollars are being used to produce a surplus of other providers. Hence, the system is broken.
